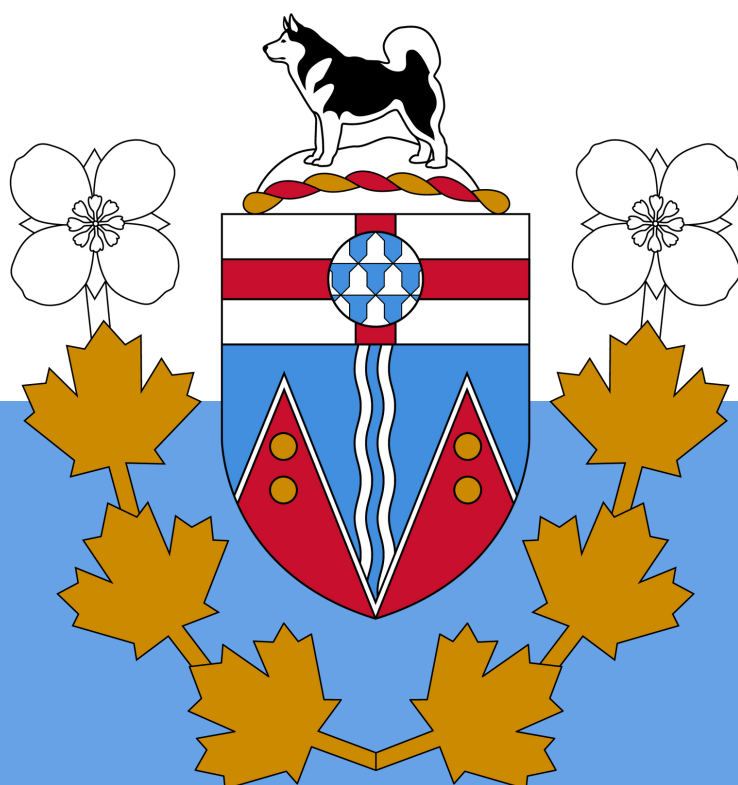

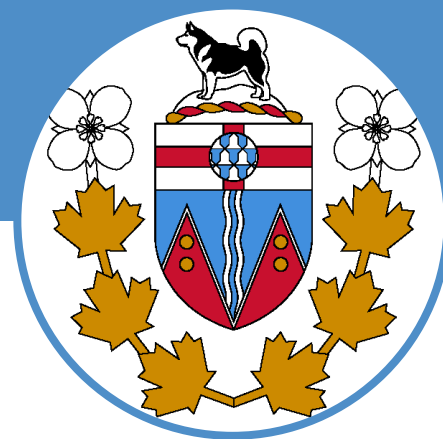

Some interesting facts from the Office of the Commissioner of Yukon

Facebook posts

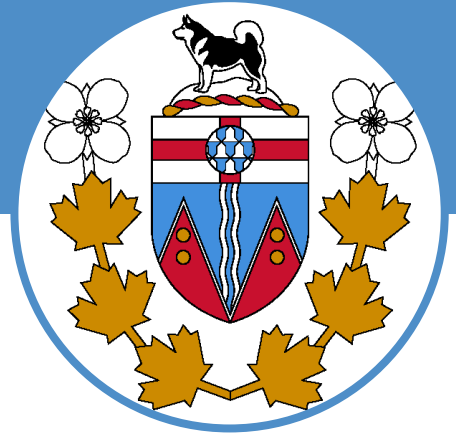
There has been an increase in followers of the Office of the Commissioner of Yukon's Facebook page from 712 to 1,144 and we have some regular followers who interact with the posts online. Our Facebook posts went from 3 to 5 a week to 2 to 3 a day. And we have developed a daily posting schedule that aligns with the Commissioner's four pillars (Family, Education, Creativity and Civic Pride).

Throughout the year, Commissioner Bernard:

- gave 25 speeches and congratulatory messages, mainly online;
- gave 20 interviews to English and French media;
- attended 97 events, meetings and get-togethers, mainly online;
- read 20 French and English books online for Christmas Storytime (December 14 to 24, 2020);
- launched the Guest Reader Program on February 1 and as of March 31, 32 stories in English and in French had been posted on the Commissioner's Facebook page;
- gave a few tours of Taylor House to high school groups, while respecting COVID-19 protocols;
- attended the Remembrance Day Ceremonies in Carcross;
- organized a Virtual Levee on January 1;
- presented 10 Orders of Yukon, 12 Governor General's Academic Medals, and 4 Outstanding Youth Achievement Awards;
- took part in the Bannock Bake-Off during National Indigenous People's Day;
- took part in the drive-thru United Way Breakfast;
- was the guest of honour at the opening of the new offices for les essentielles, the Yukon Francophone Women's Group;
- read to nine daycares and day camp groups during the Commissioner's Summer reading series;
- attended the Pink Tea, organized by Pat Duncan, Yukon Senator;
- attended the first poppy presentation, organized by the Whitehorse Legion;
- handed out new awards: The Story Laureate of Yukon, the Borealis Prize: The Commissioner of Yukon Award for Literary Contribution and the Yukon Service Pin;
- assented to 11 bills in the Legislative Assembly;
- reorganized the second floor at Taylor House and ensured the completion of the wall of photographs of former Commissioners;
- reorganized the books in the office into a library and highlighted new resources every Tuesday on Facebook;
- wrote three columns in French on the events of the Office of the Commissioner for *l'Aurore boréale* (once every two months – November 2020, January 2021, and March 2021);
- signed 148 Orders in Council; and
- signed 7 proclamations.

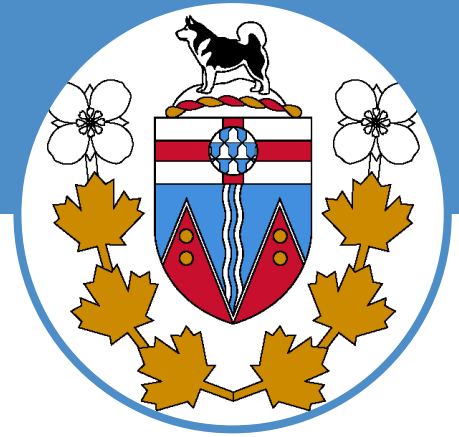

The Story Laureate of Yukon



Commissioner Bernard and Story Laureate of Yukon Michael Gates
October 16, 2020

The Story Laureate of Yukon serves as an ambassador for the literary arts, oral history and literacy in the context of Yukon's past, present and future. As an ambassador, the Story Laureate of Yukon participates in the life of the territory and is invited to attend Yukon events to publicly share works. The Story Laureate of Yukon creates work and focuses on cultural, historical and heritage themes that are relevant to the people who live in Yukon.

The term runs from January 1, 2021, to December 31, 2022.

Michael Gates was introduced as the inaugural Story Laureate of Yukon on October 16, 2020. Michael is an accomplished author who has written hundreds of articles about museums and Yukon history as well as published six books on Yukon history.

The Borealis Prize

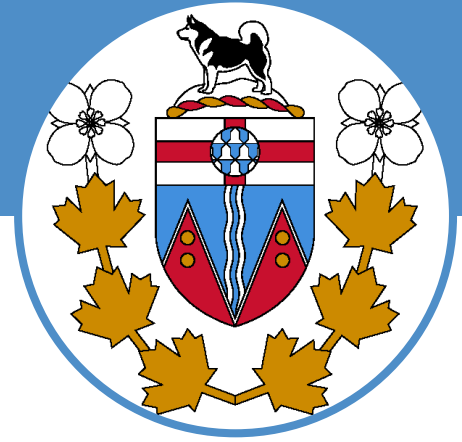

The Borealis Prize: The Commissioner of Yukon Award for Literary Contribution was established in 2020 to recognize excellence in contributions by the writers, publishers, editors and literary community builders of Yukon. The Prize is administered by the BC and Yukon Book Prizes and awarded annually by the Commissioner of Yukon.

The first ever Borealis Prize: The Commissioner of Yukon Award for Literary Contribution was awarded on September 18, 2020 to Patti Flather and Leonard Linklater for their work in founding Gwaandak Theatre and all their consequent contributions to the Yukon literary community. Both authors have brought to light issues around Indigenous experience, mixed cultures, and social justice. They received their original art piece (Northern Lights Bowl from Lumel Studios) on October 9, 2020.

The Yukon Service Pin



The Yukon Service Pin was launched in October 2020, to recognize people who have served or are serving in the military or as a first responder. In this case, first responders include paramedics, emergency medical technicians, police officers, firefighters, correction officers, rescuers and other trained members of organizations connected to this type of work, either as a volunteer or as a paid employee. Military service includes all branches of the Canadian military, including the Canadian Rangers.

The pins are distributed by the Office of the Commissioner of Yukon at 412 Main Street, Whitehorse, Yukon.
